# "TACKLING ICE IN OUR COMMUNITIES" A PRESENTATION BY SENIOR CONSTABLE DAVE FISH CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER OF THE COFFS CLARENCE LOCAL AREA COMMAND



The presentation will cover what the drug is, what it does, trend in use and the harm on the individual and the community and why it is a growing issue in Australia. Senior Constable Fish spoke to us early last year briefly on this subject when he addressed us on the topic of Home Safety for seniors, however, this presentation will be focussed entirely on crystalline methamphetamine (I.C.E.) and its effects on communities, families and individuals.

# THE U3A MOVEMENT

An article appeared in Monday's Herald penned by Neil Jeyasingam an old age psychiatrist. The main thrust of the article titled "Nursing homes are better option than talking to the walls" was the fact that a majority of ageing folk wish to remain in their own homes with a level of comfort while retaining their independence. The writer visits, on a daily basis, utterly isolated individuals who spend the bulk of their time speaking to not a single soul with his annual visit providing a rare opportunity to speak to someone other than a wall. The article prompted the following response as a Letter to the Editor, which encapsulates the aims and ideals of the U3A movement.

#### Beyond nursing homes

Old age psychiatrist Neil Jeyasingam seems to lead a very narrow life. Why hasn't he told the retirees he sees about U3A? About volunteering or joining a book club or political party? On the Central Coast, our U3A has 700-odd members. For a small yearly fee, you can run a course, attend many courses, help run the organisation or all of the above. But the best part is the friends you make. That cup of tea at half time is pure gold. Most of us live in our own homes have downsized or live independently in a retirement village. My plants are unruly because I am so busy. *Sue Young Bensville*
