#### FEBRUARY JABBERFEST - CLIMATE CHANGE V RENEWABLE ENERGY

A good audience of 104 listened intently to two interesting speakers. Committee member, Nick Reeve, prefaced the main guest speaker with a presentation on renewable energy and, particularly, CORE (Community Owned Renewable Energy), a sort of 'do it yourself' reduction of the 'carbon footprint'.

At Wildpoldscried, a village in Bavaria, the community has enthusiastically embraced 'energy farms' using solar panels and wind turbines, to try and create a joint sustainable energy future. And, apparently, at our own Byron Bay, they have Australia's first community owned power generator, with solar panels and methane gas employed. The basic problem at the moment is that, with ample coal supplies available, the cost of renewable energy cannot compete.

After morning tea, our guest speaker, Chris Gulaptis, MP, Member for Clarence, was introduced. Although his published address subject was 'Climate Change', we are happy to report that he made no reference to this phrase during his interesting talk. 'Climate Change' has been, and will be, with us forever. Chris had the good sense to talk about the urgent need to limit pollution of the atmosphere – which we all certainly agree with – and the role of renewable energy as a part of the solution.

The problem is that Australia has an abundance of coal available and our economy is part based upon this. It produces energy more cheaply, at the moment, than renewable energy sources such as solar panels, wind turbines or tidal generation. Some community members just cannot afford the infrastructure of renewable energy and governments are hard put to make tough decisions regarding their financing.

However, there has been good progress. NSW has committed to a 2020 target of producing 20% of required power by renewables and, already, 45% of renewable industries are in NSW. And, in Nyngan and Broken Hill, AGL are investing \$450,000,000 in renewable energy production, with \$65,000,000 help from the Federal Government.

Chris's very interesting talk was followed by a lively question and answer session, in which a good number of members participated.

Representing almost 30% of the Clarence Valley population, seniors over the age of sixty are significant contributors to the economy of the valley. Almost 20% volunteer their time to sporting, community, aged and disability groups. In recognition of this, Clarence Valley Council Community Development, libraries and Care & Support Services, local business and community organisations are hosting in excess of thirty events across the Clarence Valley. Educational, cultural, creative and entertainment events are on offer throughout the valley. ## **ALL CHANGE for CHANGING CLIMATE**

This course will include six of the best half-hour lectures by Professor Richard Wolfson, Professor of Physics at Middlebury College USA, together with video clips, blogs and newspaper commentary/reviews on the current state of climate change.
